Elementary Modern Greek II
4 Semester Hours

Description

In GREK-102, students review Greek letters isolated/connected forms; continue to create simple sentences using gender, plurals, pronouns, possession, verb forms, past and present tense, geographic place names, and the counting system through the introduction of meaningful vocabulary. Students will increase their proficiency in Greek script and sound system, widen their working vocabulary, learn key grammatical points, practice conversation and expand their knowledge of Greek culture. This course may be offered as self-instructional/tutor assisted.

Statement on General Education and Liberal Learning

Overall Course Objectives

Upon completion of this course the student will be able to:

1. Recognize and write familiar words in the Greek script
2. Create and read sentence level text and higher
3. Ask simple oral questions and respond accordingly
4. Identify and use key grammatical points
5. Comprehend basic text with greater facility
6. Request information
7. Appreciate the Greek language as an expression of its culture

Major Topics

- I. Writing connected and disconnected letters
- II. Developing practical and working vocabulary strategies for conversation
- III. Discussing key grammar points critical to language comprehension
- IV. Practicing question and answer scenarios in writing, speaking and listening
- V. Using exercises and dialogues with practical situations
- VI. Incorporating meaningful, cultural topics through Greek text

Course Requirements

Course requirements will vary with the instructor and may include quizzes, projects, oral presentations and exams.
