

# **COURSE OUTLINE**

## **MUSC-108** **African-American Music** 3 Semester Hours

### **HOWARD COMMUNITY COLLEGE**

#### **Description**

Open to all interested students, this course will examine the heritage of African-American music from the colonial era through the jazz age to the present. Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to identify the characteristic elements of African music, trace the development of the major idioms such as religious and ragtime music, identify important African-American composers and performers, and articulate the role of African-American music in ritual and ceremony, as transmitter of culture and as a social and political tool. (3 hours weekly)

#### **Overall Course Objectives**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Discuss how music functions in African and American Diasporan ritual and ceremonies.
2. Describe the main characteristics of African music.
3. Classify selected African vocal devices.
4. Identify and classify selected African instruments and their Diasporan derivatives.
5. Discuss the social, political, and religious functions of music in African and Diasporan cultures and discuss how those functions effect him/her today.
6. Identify African retentions in African-Latin, African-Caribbean, and African-American music.
7. Offer an informed critique of live performances of Black music and musicians.
8. Summarize the contributions of Black music to the world of music, and in particular, the music of the United States.
9. Recognize major works of selected African-American composers.
10. Write a three-page paper relating course material to the current exhibits at the Museum of African Art.
