Interested applicants must be available for the entire academic year, beginning the third week of August 2010. The program is designed for masters students ready to begin their internship experience. For the 2010/2011 academic year, we are accepting up to three master's interns.

- Two letters of reference, including at least one from a supervisor familiar with your clinical work

Nearly 7,000 students pursue studies at HCC in a variety of academic programs leading to transfer to four-year colleges or immediate employment upon graduation. An additional 14,000 students take courses for personal or professional development. Our students come from diverse racial/ethnic and geographical backgrounds, and HCC is home to many international students. In contrast to students at 4-year institutions, HCC students range widely in terms of age and socioeconomic status.

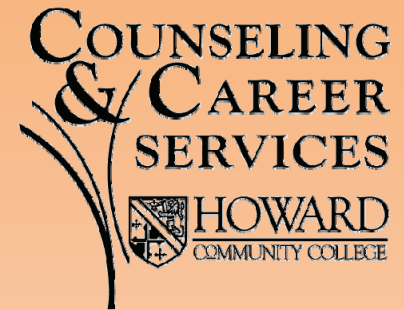
Counseling and Career Services (CCS) is housed in the spacious new Rouse Company Foundation Student Services Hall. Our wing includes Student Support Services and Disability Support Services. CCS currently includes four full-time professional counselors or psychologists, five part-time counselors or trainees, a part-time internship/co-op coordinator, a career assistant, one part-time Career Links coordinator, two full-time and two part-time office support staff, and a part-time webmaster.

Counseling and Career Services serves both HCC students and Howard County community members. In a typical year, about 1,270 clients seek services and are seen for emotional/personal and career counseling. Included in this number are approximately 385 community members.

Master's Internship Training Program



Program Description

Counseling and Career Services (CCS) offers a comprehensive training program for graduate students enrolled in master's programs in counseling psychology, clinical psychology, pastoral counseling, or related fields. Trainees will have the opportunity to provide both personal and career counseling on an individual or group basis, to engage in outreach and consultation with the campus community, and to develop knowledge of CCS operations by participating in center activities such as the job fair. To enhance the development of their clinical skills, trainees will receive intensive individual and group supervision and participate in case conferences and training seminars.

The program can accommodate trainees looking for a 10 to 20 hour per week training experience. Interested applicants must commit one academic year to the Training Program, and be available the third week of August for a two-day training. Because trainees see clients only when their supervisor is on site, no evening hours are available.

Training Experiences

Individual Clients

Counseling and Career Services currently has a 12-session limit per academic year for individual counseling. Although there is some flexibility in terms of numbers and types of clients seen, interns carry at least five clients and conduct two intake sessions per week. Individual caseloads vary depending on the training needs and interests of the trainee, and interns have the possibility of carrying two longer term cases and/or more than five clients.

Individual Supervision

At least one hour of face-to-face supervision per week is provided by senior staff. All interns are required to audiotape their sessions and submit tapes to their supervisor. Supervision includes client case conceptualization and management, exploration of therapeutic relationship dynamics, and treatment planning. Interns remain with their assigned supervisor for the entire year.

Group Supervision/Case Conference

Interns will meet once per month as a group with the program coordinator to discuss cases. During the fall semester, cases will be discussed on an informal basis. In the spring semester, formal case presentations and discussions will be held. Each trainee will be required to prepare two formal case presentations.



Training Seminars

Training seminars are held monthly, and will incorporate topics of special interest to students as well as some fixed topics. For example, initial seminars include Ethics, Diversity Issues, and Suicide Assessment and Intervention. Seminars include presentations by CCS staff and outside experts.

Campus Outreach

Interns will have the opportunity to be involved in facilitating outreach programs on various topics including anxiety and depression screening, health and wellness fairs, eating disorders awareness week activities, resume review workshops, career infusion programming with developmental English classes, and orientation to our services.

Additional Activities

Individual Therapy with Career Links Students

Career Links is a program within Counseling and Career Services that provides support to low to moderate income single parents and/or displaced homemakers. Interns with a specific interest in this population may include Career Links clients on their caseload.

Individual Work and Outreach with the Athletic Department

Interns with an interest in sport psychology may elect to provide mental skills training and/or outreach programming to individuals or teams in the Athletic Department. Examples of past outreach topics include career development, goal setting, team building, focus, and persisting despite obstacles. Interns work with student-athletes to enhance strengths on the field and in the classroom.

Group Therapy

If available, interns may elect to co-lead therapy groups with a senior staff member. Trainees who co-lead groups will receive one additional hour of supervision per week.

Weekly Case Conference for Clinicians

Senior staff meets weekly for peer supervision and support. These informal meetings are open to our interns, schedule permitting.

Campus Activities and Organizations

For trainees who are interested in learning more about how Counseling and Career Services fits within the greater campus community, there are opportunities to become involved in campus activities. For example, trainees may elect to serve as a liaison to one of the many campus clubs, or become involved in campus committees such as the HCC Book Connection or the Diversity Committee.
